Dear Family and Friends,

ome of you may know that in July of 2024, a National Eucharistic Congress will be held in Indianapolis. One purpose of this Congress is to ask the Holy Spirit to revive our love for the Eucharist. For the past few months, I have been pondering two things with regard to the Eucharist. First, what are the effects of receiving the Eucharist? and second, what are the effects of spending time in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament? One of my favorite sections in the Catechism of the Catholic Church is the section on the fruits or the main effects of receiving the Eucharist. Here is a portion of paragraph 1397: "The Eucharist commits us to the poor. To receive, in truth, the Body and Blood of Christ given up for us, we must recognize Christ in the poorest, his brethren."

Who are the poor? We are! Who became poor that we may become rich? Jesus! I love this passage from 2 Corinthians 8:9: "You know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich." Hopefully, in receiving the One who became poor, we can be more aware of seeing Christ in the poor, in one another.

Also, St. Teresa of Calcutta has been my "mentor" in pondering the effects of Adoration. I remember the lesson I learned from her using this acronym: I.C.U. As a result of Adoration, her love for Jesus became more intimate, her love for the poor more compassionate, and her love for others more understanding.

As Servants of God's Love, we pray to be a sign and a witness of God's personal, strong love for his people and to be a witness (by God's grace and the power of the Holy Spirit) of the kind of love we are to have for the Lord. May this be so as we receive and adore the Lord Jesus.

Come, let us receive and adore the One who became poor for us, that we may help others become rich in Christ.




